




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A word from the President

REIF Presentation

Role and functioning of the REIF

[The Representation of French Social Security Institutions to the European Union \(REIF\)](#) was created in May 2003 as part of the Agency for the Development and Coordination of International Relations (Adecric).

Since 1 April 2015, it has brought together all the branches of the general scheme for employees and self-employed persons and the agricultural scheme: health insurance (CNAM), retirement (CNAV), family (CNAF), debt collection (Urssaf Caisse nationale, formerly Acof), agricultural social security (CCMSA), as well as the National School for Social Security (EN3S), French National Security Funds (UCANSS). The Centre for European and International Social Security Liaison (CLEISS) and the Pension Fund for Flying Personnel Employed in Civil Aviation (CRPNPAC) have also joined. The National Union for Employment in Industry and Commerce (Unédic) and the National Solidarity Fund for Autonomy (CNSA) have been observing members of the REIF since 2001. The REIF has a permanent representation office in Brussels. It is managed by an association under the French Law of 1901, "The REIF Management Association" created by all the above-mentioned organisations.

Governance and organisation

On 31 January 2022, the REIF is chaired by Ms Isabelle Sancerni, President of the Board of Directors of National family allowance fund (Cnaf), accompanied by the Vice-Presidents Gérard Rivière, President of the Board of Directors of the National old-age insurance fund (Cnav), Jean-Eudes Tesson, President of the Board of Directors of the Central agency for social security bodies (Urssaf Caisse nationale) and Pascal Cormery, President of the MSA Central fund (CCMSA). Mr. Fabrice Gombert, President of the Board of the National Health Insurance Fund (CNAM), is the REIF's Treasurer. The secretariat of the REIF is provided by the Cnaf, in the person of Olivier Corbobesse.

The French social security funds collectively and directly steer the REIF and determine its missions and the direction of its action.

The directorates (or missions) for international and European relations within the member social security bodies provide the link between the national and European levels. The REIF enables these organisations and their networks to bring their analyses and positions to the attention of European decision-makers (European Commission, European Parliament via MEPs, Council via the French Permanent Representation), backed by the expertise that only they have at their disposal, before the publication of legislative texts.

The REIF office is in Brussels at the European House of Social Protection, alongside the permanent representations of the German (DSV) and Austrian (DVSV) social security funds, the European Platform of Social Protection Institutions (ESIP) and the International Association of Mutual Benefit Societies (AIM). Its three-person team consists of a permanent delegate, Arnaud Emériaux, responsible for pensions, secondment, recovery, and fraud, and two project managers, Audrey Tourniaire, responsible for family, social inclusion and employment issues, and Anne-Claire Le Bodic, responsible for health and digital issues.

Its creation was a response to the growth of the issue of European social policy, which was not strictly limited to the prerogatives set out in the Community Treaties. Indeed, although the Member States are free to organise their social security systems, European legislation, linked to the implementation of the internal market, has a direct impact on the legislation applicable to social security.

It is because they are aware of the decisive importance of the debates and negotiations held in Brussels and the effects on their own functioning that the French social security institutions have decided to set up this representation, which complements the French permanent representation in Brussels.

Missions of the REIF

The REIF has three main missions:

- To publicise, promote and defend the values and principles of the French social protection system with European interlocutors: solidarity, quality and equal access for all to social security benefits, as well as its organisation and financial interests;
- Keeping an active watch on developments in European legal construction that may have consequences for the social policies implemented by the French social security system or their management methods;
- Alerting and mobilising, as necessary, the French organisations on the issues in question.

REIF President

After several terms as a Director in Social security organisations, Isabelle Sancerni was elected in 2018 as President of the Board of Directors of the National Family Allowance Fund (Cnaf). In 2022, she was re-elected for a second term. She chairs the Board of REIF. In addition, she is a member of the Board of ISSA (International Social Security Association with more than 150 member countries) where she chairs the Family Benefit Technical Commission.



Nicolas Schmit

European Commissioner for Jobs and Social Rights

Nicolas Schmit is European Commissioner for Employment and Social Rights since 2019. Nicolas Schmit holds a master's degree in French literature and a doctorate in international economic relations from the University of Aix-Marseille. He held several positions in the government of his native country, Luxembourg, before taking up the post of Counselor at the Luxembourg Permanent Representation to the European Union in 1990. He was subsequently appointed Minister Delegate for Foreign Affairs and Immigration in 2004, then Minister for Labour and Employment in 2009, and finally in 2013 Minister for Labour, Employment, and the Social Economy. In 2019, he was a member of the European Parliament for the Luxembourg Socialist Workers' Party.

Martine Vignau has been involved in trade union responsibilities since 1987. She has always worked to defend employees' interests and to build fair and equitable solidarity for all. 


Elise Debiès

Round table # 1

How to respond to the demographic challenges linked to ageing in the EU?

9.30 – 10.45 am

This round table, which will be introduced by a comparative presentation of the impact of ageing in France and in Europe, aims to highlight the challenges common to all Member States but also the specificities of the approaches implemented (e.g. social action policy of social security organisations in France, holistic approach and use of digital technology in Denmark, etc.).

Themes to be addressed

- Specificity and added value of extra-legal social action programs;
- Policies and actions to maintain populations in rural areas;
- Access to social rights for insured people;
- Establishment of integrated network services at local level to facilitate administrative procedures for insured persons;
- Life cycle approach (lifelong health prevention, employment policy, work-life balance, etc.);
- Home-based approach to preserve the autonomy of the elderly and to propose an individualised global offer;
- Cost of institutional care from a comparative perspective.

Round table #2

Support for families and job seekers, two complementary levers for an effective anti-poverty policy

10.45 am – 12.00 pm

The central theme is the fight against poverty, which is addressed through two different but complementary strands.

One strand places work-life-balance measures as key for parents' employment which is an essential condition against the risk of poverty for families; the second sets unemployment benefits as an economic and social stabiliser during periods of non-employment.

Themes to be addressed

- Work-life balance and investment in childcare to ensure parents' participation in the labour market (including measures taken during the Covid crisis);
- Presentation of the role of unemployment insurance as an economic and social stabiliser, the link with national solidarity;
- Specific measures taken during the Covid crisis regarding unemployment insurance;
- «Life cycle»/»life course» approach and personalised support to insured persons.

Round table #3

Access to health innovations and price regulation mechanisms

2.00 – 3.30pm

With the recast of the European pharmaceutical framework only a few months away, this round-table aims to take stock of the challenges Member States face in ensuring real (and ideally timely) access to health innovations for patients while ensuring sustainability for health insurance schemes. Innovative solutions, in particular new types of contracts, will be discussed.

Themes to be addressed

- What are the difficulties encountered in accessing pharmaceutical innovations?
- What innovative practices are or can be implemented? How can access be improved while containing prices and ensuring sustainability?
- What is the role of the EU in supporting Member States and which mechanisms should be included in the Pharmaceutical Strategy?
- Can multilateral cooperation support quicker and affordable access?

Round table #4

How can social competition be reduced while ensuring fair and equitable mobility?

3.30 – 5 pm

In the uncertain legislative context induced by the absence of agreement on the revision of the Coordination Regulations, and while forms of mobility are evolving, this round table will highlight the political avenues envisaged for adapting the legal framework, as well as highlighting good practices, pilot projects and cooperation between social security organisations in the EU.

Themes to be addressed

- The importance of cooperation in the EU: how can the principle of loyal cooperation between social security administrations in the EU be implemented in practice?
- An example of successful cooperation: the construction of the international mobility management tool by Urssaf caisse nationale, inspired by the Belgian National Social Security Office systems ;
- Concrete levers and actions to improve the rights of mobile workers
- Empirical and economic studies on a large scale to better measure the phenomena of fraud in respect to posting and pluriactivity ;
- Prospective proposals: possible alternatives to the principle of a single applicable legislation of European coordination regulations?


The Economic, Social and Environmental Council (ESEC) is the constitutional assembly of the Republic and advises the Government and Parliament. It is the sum of intermediary bodies
